Behind every plane, every flight, every parcel, every passenger, there's a story. These numbers from 2024 may seem like statistics, but they carry the weight of real lives and lasting impact.

Flying people forward

Q Arnhem Land

As a weekly passenger on MAF flights, Charles Yunupingu travelled from Wandawuy to Garrthalala to attend the Makarrata senior program at Laynhapuy Homelands School. These flights enabled him to pursue his education, while staying connected to family and culture. "I've enjoyed Makarrata," Charles said. "My favourite subjects are English, Maths and Speaking."

The program combines classroom learning with cultural responsibilities. "The success of the program is because the students are boarding on country, and they get to return to their homelands

on a Friday afternoon," said Senior Teacher Emma Toll. "On weekends, they're fulfilling cultural obligations, participating in ceremonies or helping with hunting."

Charles was also selected for the Northern Territory Youth Voice Peak Group, representing homeland schools and Indigenous students at government meetings.

"Despite the remoteness of many East Arnhem communities, MAF flights ensure isolation isn't a barrier to education," said Ben Brown, Country Director for MAF in Arnhem Land.

Delivering vital supplies

Q Papua New Guinea

MAF flights provide more than just transport—they're a vital lifeline for remote communities. Store owner Joe John depends on MAF to deliver essential goods like rice, salt, tinned fish, noodles, cooking oil and soap.

"There's no other way I could get freight like this—only MAF helps by bringing it to Wanakipa," he says. These deliveries help families survive, support local store owners, and ensure teachers and health workers have what they need. Even small items like mobile phone credit are crucial. "When there's no MAF plane and no phone credit, the phone just sits there," says Community Health Worker Eric Lomba.

"When MAF comes, I can call people who need help—or just catch up with family."

In remote parts of Papua New Guinea, MAF's cargo service is so much more than logistics—it's a connection to life, health and hope.

Flying further, faster

Q Arnhem Land

"It's about using the right tool for the job, and the Caravan has proved to be exactly that," says former Country Director Matt Henderson.

In Arnhem Land, where remote communities rely on MAF for essential transport, the Cessna Caravan has been a game-changer. With capacity for nine passengers or 1,000kg of cargo, it often replaces two smaller aircraft with a single, more efficient flight.

According to Senior Pilot Phil Techand, the Caravan's faster cruising speed, autopilot, and higher altitude capabilities reduce flight times and improve comfort. The turbine engine also means lower maintenance and less downtime compared to piston aircraft, helping MAF to maximise its impact.

As the needs in Arnhem Land grow and change, the Caravan ensures MAF can continue delivering help, hope and healing to some of Australia's most isolated communities.

Flying for education

Q Papua New Guinea

Instead of trekking for hours through rugged terrain, Justin Petrus, a high school teacher at Eliptamin Junior High School, reached Telefomin in under 10 minutes – thanks to an unexpected MAF flight. Diverted by weather, the flight gave Justin a rare chance to travel quickly and safely over the mountains.

"It was an interesting moment for me, and I thank MAF for bringing me here safely," he said. Thanks to the flight, Justin gained some extra time to complete vital school paperwork. His journey with MAF came full circle—back in 2014, Justin received his graduation certificate from MAF pilot Mathias at Oksapmin High School in Tekin, and now, years later, it was Mathias who unexpectedly helped him reach Telefomin.

Since 2007, MAF has supported schools like Oksapmin by flying in supplies, teachers and students. For educators like Justin, MAF's flights are more than transport—they are opportunities to grow, serve and inspire the next generation.

Serving something greater

Q Liberia

Meet Bako Ranarivelo and her husband, Nary Razafinimpanana, a missionary couple from Madagascar, now serving with MAF in Liberia. Bako, Finance Manager for MAF's Liberia and Guinea programs, helps ensure flights continue reaching isolated communities with medical aid, education and the Gospel. Nary, an ophthalmologist, volunteers at ELWA Hospital, providing vital eye care.

Though far from home and their three grown children, they've embraced Liberian culture – cassava leaf is now a favourite dish! For them, serving is more than logistics or medicine; it's about being part of a mission that transforms lives. "Every small effort counts," says Nary. "We're part of something much bigger than ourselves."

Empowering our partners

Q Guinea

MAF's partnership with Catholic Relief Services (CRS) is transforming access in north-eastern Guinea, where a two hour flight replaces a 60-hour road trip.

This time-saving journey helps CRS focus on vital community projects, like market gardening, rather than losing days to rough travel. "In two hours we are there and then we start work. It's a clear advantage,"

said Moussa Dominique of CRS Guinea.

A local doctor in a remote community also called the flight a "huge blessing" for his family, and future medical teams visiting from the USA. By enabling faster, safer travel, MAF helps partners like CRS reach isolated communities with essential services and support.

Transforming gospel mission

Q South Sudan

A new airstrip opened in Naliel, South Sudan in 2024, transforming mission work among the local Toposa people, by drastically reducing travel time and expanding ministry opportunities. Missionaries Peter and Rebecca Franz from 'Seeking the Lost' were instrumental in getting the airstrip built. "This airstrip was born out of my heart." Peter shared.

The journey from Eldoret takes two days by road, but now, flights make access far easier. The airstrip supports a growing mission base, a school, and ministry initiatives, enabling missionaries to reach more people with the gospel.

I love working at mission organisations, and have managed bequests for many years. We have partnered with 'Gathered Here', an online platform that enables people to write 'simple Wills' for free. A simple Will is one that doesn't involve complex investments, like multiple properties, shares or trusts. You can create and edit as many versions as you like on the platform. The Will only becomes a legal document once it is downloaded, printed, signed and witnessed.

Our goal is to bring help, hope and healing to remote communities through aviation, in the Name of Jesus Christ. We ask you to give some thought to including a gift in your Will to help us achieve our missional goals.

Invest in our next good and faithful servants

As MAF retires faithful aircraft like 5Y-BNG through the global fleet renewal program, your support can help continue their legacy.

In June 2023, 5Y-BNG delivered life-saving cargo to Renk, in South Sudan's Upper Nile State. On board were boxes of medicine and therapeutic food for families fleeing the violent conflict in neighbouring Sudan.

"The sachets were for children suffering from severe acute malnutrition," said MAF pilot Andy MacDonald.

"Ten boxes can treat ten children over six to eight weeks. It may not seem like much, but for ten kids, it meant survival." Flights like these were part of 5Y-BNG's faithful service over many years, alongside other retiring aircraft around the world. But the need remains.

MAF's global fleet renewal is about more than replacing aircraft. It's about ensuring safe, reliable service for the long haul.

In Australia, we're aiming to raise \$1 million by June 30 to support this vital effort.

Bringing help to isolated communities

MAF flies to over 1,000 remote locations, delivering food, medicine and emergency aid. From medical evacuations to disaster response, every MAF flight ensures isolated communities receive vital help when they need it most.

Emergency flight brings safe arrival

Q Madagascar

For Norfinne and her newborn, MAF's swift response meant the difference between life and death. While travelling in an isolated part of western Madagascar, Norfinne unexpectedly went into labour, miles from medical help. "We panicked," said her husband, Velona. "We were in the middle of nowhere."

After reaching a small health centre, the nurse quickly recognised the danger: "She cannot deliver naturally. If we don't act fast, both mother and baby are at risk."

MAF helped fly in a medical team and transported Norfinne to the capital city for an emergency C-section – a journey that would have taken four days by road, but just over an hour by air.

"She was stable during the flight," said nurse Aina Nomena Rakotondrazafy. Thanks to the quick intervention, both mother and baby girl, Soavita, are doing well.

"I was so scared," Norfinne said.
"But I'm very happy – I now have a daughter."





Clean water brings clear impact

♥ Kenya

MAF is helping remote communities, like Thuur in northern Kenya, by flying essential aid to where it's needed most. Last year, MAF pilot Daniel flew a team from Water Matters Sweden to distribute water filters, providing clean drinking water for families and schools.

The impact was immediate.

Villagers watched in amazement as murky water turned crystal-clear.

"Water filters are a lifeline for our community," said health officer Meshack Gayere. "They ensure safe drinking water for our families."

This region faces water scarcity, contamination and disease outbreaks, making safe water a rare and vital resource. By partnering with organisations like Water Matters, MAF helps life-changing solutions reach those in need.

"We love partnering with MAF because they fly to remote places where these filters are needed," said Marcus from Water Matters Sweden. Thanks to their efforts, 17 villages—around 2,000 people—now have clean water, bringing hope, health and a future, free from waterborne disease.

Bringing hope to isolated communities

Every MAF flight carries the promise of hope, connecting remote communities to medical care, education and the Gospel.

Whether reuniting families, supporting local churches, or empowering isolated villages, MAF helps people around the world look to a brighter future, by providing practical help and spiritual encouragement, where it's needed most.

An answer to prayer at high altitude

♥ Tanzania

MAF brought hope to remote mountain communities in northern Tanzania, where access to essential healthcare had long been out of reach. Thanks to MAF flights, a mobile clinic reached the Maasai community at the Olemilei airstrip, offering lifesaving care to mothers and children.

Before MAF was involved, "Many of our children died from preventable diseases like measles and polio," said Anna Fanuel, a local mother. "Mothers had a big challenge accessing medical care."

Now, the village receives vital services, including vaccinations, prenatal checks and medicine.

"It is an answered prayer," shared Nashipai. "Today, a MAF aircraft brought doctors and nurses to care for our people."

Evangelist Elisha, who supports the outreach, added, "MAF played a crucial role in promoting health."

Despite the challenges of flying into high-altitude terrain, MAF's pilots remain committed and continue to bring hope where it's needed most.





New possibilities in the desert

Q Chad

In remote northern Chad, where a desert journey can take five gruelling days, MAF brings hope by making life-changing work possible. Association Pour le Développement et la Paix (ADP), which serves the Teda people, relies on MAF flights to bring in short-term workers, who support vital medical, literacy and development programs.

"The Lord has grown our team to where it is, because of MAF," says ADP director Mark Ortman. With safe, efficient air access, doctors provide urgent care, specialists repair essential hospital equipment in a day, and literacy programs flourish.

MAF's impact goes beyond transport, creating opportunities for connection, empowerment and faith. MAF pilots, like Becki Dillingham, inspire Teda women with new possibilities. At the dusty MAF airstrip, light and hope shine, as lives are transformed in one of the world's most remote and challenging locations.

The challenge of reaching some of these areas in Kenya has always been distance, bad terrain, insecurity, and poor infrastructure. MAF has made distance and terrain a thing of the past with the availability of flights to the previously hard to reach areas, bringing sight and hope to these communities."

Bringing healing to isolated communities

Every MAF flight is a commitment to healing. From flying medical evacuations and delivering vaccines, to transporting healthcare professionals and helping mothers reach safe care, MAF brings lifesaving support to over 1.000 isolated communities. restoring health, dignity and hope in places where care is hard to access.

Reaching vital care in time

♥ Timor-Leste

When Antoniza Ximenes fell seriously ill, local treatment on Atauro Island failed to improve her condition. She needed urgent care at the national hospital in Dili, but a long, risky boat journey across deep waters could have worsened her fragile state.

MAF provided another way. In just 15 minutes, Antoniza was flown safely to Dili, where she received life-saving treatment and recovered within days.

"I thank God because He showed us the way," said her husband, Godinho. "Flying with MAF helped save my wife's life."

During their hospital stay, a MAF care pack offered food, water and a phone voucher—practical support during a difficult time.

MAF pilot Joe Farren reflects, "I think it's one of the biggest blessings of my life, that we get to meet people in their worst moments and provide opportunities that

A lifeline to treatment

South Sudan to Uganda

For families flying with MAF from South Sudan to CURE Children's Hospital in Uganda, each flight is a lifeline.

On one journey, 17 passengers, many of them mothers holding babies on their laps, were flown for life-saving treatment of hydrocephalus, a neurological condition.

"Hydrocephalus is eminently treatable," explains MAF pilot

Matt Marples, "but your quality of life without treatment is horrible."

In South Sudan, surgery for the condition is unaffordable and unavailable. These mothers, many flying for the first time, are deeply grateful for the chance to access care at no cost. For many, the flight is their only hope.

"If my youngest had been born with hydrocephalus, we would have stayed in Canada a bit longer," pilot Matt reflects. "And the outcome would most likely have been good. So many of the people we fly don't have access to that."
